# History of Toll Gate School

In 1870, the valley of Toll Gate was the stamping grounds of the famous chief, *Colarau*, and his braves. It was the route to their trading post, which was on the site of the old D & F store.

The name Toll Gate comes from the short creek that runs through this area. Its course is probably about 10 miles in length. In the early days, it was spanned by a wooden bridge, a short distance south of East 6th Avenue, and about halfway between Potomac Street and Chambers Road. A toll was charged for crossing the bridge, thus the name Toll Gate.

Prior to the year 1877, the children who lived here attended the school at District 24, called the Fahey School. In 1877, Mr. John Gully, and Mr. P.Q. Kennedy met with the superintendent in Denver and formed District No.25. Mr. Michael O'Donnell was the first teacher and taught in a claim shack somewhere near the site of the last school. He was followed by one more schoolmaster, whose name is unknown at this time. Then came Miss Cynthia Westover, who later became a well-known writer known as Cynthia Westover Alden; Then Miss Ellen Donohue, Miss Mary Hogan, later known as Mrs. John DeLaney; Miss Elizabeth Clifford, later known as Mrs. John Gully, Miss Belle Clifford, later known as Mrs. Andrew McAloon. Miss Lucille Harward and Miss Josie Smith, later known as Mrs. Robert Moffit. These teachers taught before the turn of the century and only Mrs. McAloon and Miss Harward were still living in 1954.

The first school terms were for three months because of lack of funds and the difficulty of getting to school in bad weather.

About 1898, Mr. Gully offered the use of a small dwelling house on his place and this was used as a school until about 1902. In those days, Arapahoe County extended from Denver to the Kansas state line, and from the northern boundary of Adams County to the southern boundary of the present Arapahoe County line. The county seat was Denver.

In 1901, when the "Rush Bill" divided old Arapahoe County, our county took its present form with Littleton as the county seat. The Deputy Superintendent was Mr. J. S. Eagleton.

The district launched its building program in 1902 when need demanded a better building. According to records, a special tax of 15 mills was levied and a new school was erected at the cost of \$600.00. This building also served as a community center, until it burned in September of 1923. The district then paid tuition to District 69 for two years. In 1925, another bond was issued for \$2500 and a new

building was erected at Potomac Street and East Mississippi Avenue. The district then extended west to Havana Street. In 1947, an agreement was made with District 69, which was Cunningham School, to let them annex two sections of land. Then in 1952 the half section known as Florence Gardens was ceded to District 28J (Aurora Public Schools) on petition of the people of the area.

Following that time, the people of the district began thinking of a new modern school. Because of the availability of natural gas at the intersection of South Chambers Road and East Mississippi, it was decided that this would be the new location. Another bond was issued for \$19,000 in June 1953. The new building was completed in January 1954.

The school superintendents in Arapahoe County during this time were: Miss Kathryn Maloney, Miss Margaret Eddy, Mr. Louis J. Rote, Mr. D. W. Working, Mr. Clarence Eddlebute, Mrs. Sada Wilson, Mrs. Ruth Vertrees, Mrs. Josipha Brown, Mrs. Minnie Davis, Mrs. Mary Peterson, Mrs. Thelma Hastings, and Miss Beulah Davies. (Mrs. Anderson).

After 1900, the teachers were Miss Agnes Smith, Miss Mary Kennedy, Miss Ruth Rudy, Miss Mary Gully (Mrs. John O'Brien), Miss Helen Kennedy, Mrs. Schaffer, Mrs. Caroline Braun, Mr. Beggs, Mrs. Gladys Breuklander, Mrs. Madeline Pennington, Mrs. Foster, Mrs. Grace Wilson, Mrs. Dorothy Walker, and Mrs. Ruth Knittel.

The School Board members were: Mr. and Mrs. John Gully, Mr. P.G. Kennedy, Mr. J. W. Kennedy, Mr. Wm Gully, Mrs. Mary F. O'Brien, Mr. Charles McMahon, Mr. Charles Gray, Mrs. Ruth Frost, Mrs. John Kirk, Mr. Dwight Meador, Mr. Edward Ritter, Miss Helen Kennedy, Mr. A. Wm. Ritter, Mr. James P. O'Brien, Mr. Carl Moritzen, and Mr. Don Rains.


