Spotlight on the Mayors of Aurora

Did you know that the Town of Fletcher/City of Aurora have had 43 Mayors since its beginnings back in 1891. With each issue of the Advocate Newsletter we'll take a quick look at each of them. Special thanks to Carolyn Brassell for her research and assistance.

MAYOR #20 Jasper Parrish

- Served from 1920 1921
- He was born 4 March 1878 in Fulton County, Illinois
- Married Kathryn Beech Watson on 1 November 1906 in Warren, Illinois
- No known children
- He worked as a farmer, speculator in the stock yards, merchant & at the Denver Ordinance Plant
- He lived at 1368 Dayton from prior to 1920 through 1940
- He would have been 42 years old when he became Mayor
- He died sometime after 1952
- Colorado Governor at the time he was Mayor was Oliver Shoup
- While he was in office:
 - Town Marshall A.G. "Pop" Stitt's Fitzsimons Bus & Taxi Company ferries

- people from the trolley stop at Galena to Fitzsimons making Colfax & Peoria a small commercial center
- Col. Arthur Hart, a former patient, builds a house, 13 cottages & a small Dutch mill near the hospital
- Army Medical Corps persuaded to not close the army hospital
- U.S. Army Hospital No. 21 name changed to Fitzsimons Army Hospital
- August 1920 Denver Tramway worker went on strike for higher wages

Aurora's Historic Newspaper Digitization Project

As most of you already know, the Aurora Historical Society has supported the Aurora Historic Newspaper Digitization Project since it began in 2015. The project has been very successful. The *Aurora Democrat* has been digitized and is available online to anyone with an internet connection. In the past, it was only available on microfiche and you had to either go the History Colorado or the Aurora History Museum to access it. The cost to digitize the Aurora Democrat was \$16,716.73. \$4,069.45 of that amount came from Aurora Historical Society members. That covered issues from December 22, 1909 through September 15, 1955 (1887 issues).

The *Aurora Advocate* is currently being digitized. To complete the digitization of the *Aurora Advocate* from 1953 through 1972 will cost \$22,072. The Aurora Historical Society paid \$403.00 to digitize the *Aurora Advocate* from October 2, 1968 through December 25, 1968. AHS members had previously donated \$409.80 to digitizing the *Aurora Advocate*. Issues from July 21,1949 through December 25, 1952 (116 issues) are already digitized and available online.

March Sand Creek Trail Speaker- Beth Nobles

Beth had her first experience with trails as a member of the Youth Conservation Corps in Illinois state parks while still in high school. Since then, she's worked in museums, cultural institutions, nonprofit organization and higher education with a common theme—building partnerships for increased organizational stability and community investment. Following twenty years at the University of Iowa Foundation, she led the new nonprofit Texas Mountain Trail in Far West Texas for a decade under the auspices of the Texas Historical Commission; and served as Deputy Director of the statewide advocacy nonprofit, BikeTexas during the extended medical leave of their Executive Director. She served as President of the Tierra Grande Texas Master Naturalist chapter; has organized heritage bike routes and wildlife trails; and enjoys hiking, biking and trail running. She's a graduate of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where, in the late 70s she rode her bike to class using the protected bike lanes on campus. Beth's connection with history began early. She would accompany her mother—a reference librarian—to work every Saturday and was given free rein in the library's archives including pre-microfilm leather-bound volumes of Civil War era newspapers. She's currently reading Carl Sandburg's six-volume biography of Abraham Lincoln; and when she travels home to central Illinois, visits Sandburg- and Lincoln-related historic sites or rides on the Rt. 66 bike route.

Beth moved to Denver in the summer of 2017 to become Executive Director of the Sand Creek Regional Greenway Partnership. She is a board member of Northeast Transportation Connections and is part of the be well Community Collaborative for the Foundation for Sustainable Urban Communities.

Aurora Is Center for Air Force Academy Opening

The new United States Air Force Academy, which begins its career on Aurora soil, both legally and geographically, is to be dedicated next Monday with dignitaries from all points and the occasion has been suitably recognized by Mayor William H. Mansfield in an official proclamation.

The flags are to fly next Monday-(bunting is to be spread—and in every way, Aurora is to acknowledge this "new child" that has been born in its midst. Great crowds are expected for this dedication ceremony next Monday.Be ready to help, in any way requested to make the visits of the big government brass something they not soon will forget.

Many reservations have been provided for in Aurora motels for out-of-town guests who are connected with the program of dedication. So, unfurl the flag Monday, in honor of this day of days—the dedication of the new United States Air Force Academy.

Represented will be all the newspaper wire services, Associated Press, United News, etc. Provisions have been made for reporters from leading U.

S. newspapers. Included among these reporters will, of course, be sports writers from the leading newspapers. This being the slack season in their field, they'll be present to anticipate the football and other athletic outlooks of the new West Point of the Air.

The actual formal program is to include addresses by Harold E. Talbott, Secretary of the Air Force, and the swearing in of the first class. Part of the ceremonies includes Gen. Nathan F. Twining. of air force academy men.

For at least three years, perhaps several years longer, the Air Force Academy is to be located at Lowry Field. It just, so happens that the portion of Lowry Field set aside for the new academy is within the boundaries of the incorporated city of Aurora.

It is not expected that Aurora, is to see much of the new cadets, because it Is understood that a rigid program keeps these personable young men quite closely

confined to their Academy confines. However, it is reasonable to believe that these young men, with short liberties, will come to Aurora rather than Denver to mail letters home and buy any pins, needles, thread and such other accessories as they may need.

Feminine Aurora hearts may remain in a pit-a-pat situation. Recognizing the over-all situation, Mayor William H. Mansfield Tuesday night declared he was issuing a proclamation that appropriately saluted the dedication of the Air Force Academy on Aurora soil. Mayor Mansfield asks that flags be properly displayed next Monday. He requests the bunting be unfurled and that citizens of Aurora be ready to help, in any way requested to make the visits of the big government brass something they may not soon forget.

Many reservations have been provided for in Aurora motels for out-of-town guests who are connected with the program of dedication.

So, unfurl the flag Monday, in honor of this day of days—the dedication of the new United States Air Force Academy.
