

Spotlight on the Mayors of Aurora

Did you know that the Town of Fletcher/City of Aurora have had 44 Mayors since its beginnings back in 1891. With each issue of the Advocate



Newsletter we'll take a quick look at each of them. Special thanks to Carolyn Brassell for her research and assistance.

MAYOR #25 Charles F. Holzer

- Served from April 13, 1931 April 7, 1939
- He was born March 2, 1896 in Brooklyn, New York
- Married to Ida Juni on February 3, 1925. Ida died April 24, 1925
- They had a son, Charles Holzer Jr. who was born April 19, 1925
- Married to Frances Fay on February 17, 1927
- He came to Colorado in 1923
- He was a branch manager of Aurora National Bank at Fitzsimons until it closed in 1933
- He lived at 1237 Chester Street
- He also sold insurance and real estate
- He died on August 25,1939
- He would have been 34 years old when he became Mayor
- Colorado Governors when he was Mayor: Billy Adams, Edwin Johnson, Ray Talbot & Teller Ammons
- While he was in office:
 - Unemployed Citizens League was formed
 - Aurora National Bank closed, found to be insolvent and ordered in receivership
 - Lucy Chapin forms a depositors committee, bank reorganized in December 1933
 - T.F. Gilligan, the bank president, indicted for embezzlement, convicted, served 6 years in Federal penitentiary in Leavenworth. He never returned to Aurora.
 - Fitzsimons slated for closing. Denver cancels 99 year lease, gives land to the Army.

"Gase" Given Off Causes Smarting and the Organ Hastens to Take Relief Measures.

The "gas" given off by a freshly peeled onion makes itself apparent in two ways—by a strong aroma which is at once apparent to the sense of smell, and by a smarting of the eyeballs, which, being very sensitive, are hurt by this substance to which they are not accustomed.

The nerves of the eye immediately signal the brain to turn on the tears or liquid which is secreted by the body as a natural eye-wash. This, flowing over the eyeball, forms a curtain which prevents the onion "gas" from coming in direct contact with the nerves and thus injuring them.

Tears are present in the eye at all times. When we wink, a tiny drop of the tear-liquid is smeared across the ball of the eye and washes off particles of dust which may have accumulated. But when this liquid is produced so rapidly that it cannot be carried off by the trough at the lower part of the eye, the tears overflow and run down the face.

In order to consolidate the request for federal aid for school buildings in the Aurora area, the land upon which the Fitzsimons Hospital is located, has been transferred from the Sable School District to District 28J. Both the Aurora schools and the Fitzsimons Hospital thru the commanding General had maderequests for federal assistance in the building of necessary school buildings Now that the claims have been consolidated, it is felt the area will have a much better chance of receiving aid within the near future.

Children living on the post at Fitzsimons have for years attended Denver schools. They will continue to do so for the present and until federal funds are made available for school ol buildings in the Aurora area.

Under recently enacted federal statutes, school districts providing schools for federally connected children are being reimbursed from federal funds.

An enrollment in excess of 2500 pupils for the September 1951 term, is expected in Aurora schools. Only a part of the building need can be met with local district revenue. The remainder must come from other sources. Within less than a year or about the time it would take to com plet e needed buildings, there will be need ded two additional elementary schools and an addition to house junior high school students. Capacity of our five buildings on a full day basis 2090.

Online Lecture: Colorado Military Women April 21, Noon to 1p.m.

Colorado women from every corner of the state enlisted in the military, joined the workforce, and volunteered on the home front. As military women, they served as nurses and in hundreds of noncombat positions. In defense plants they riveted steel, made bullets, inspected bombs, operated cranes, and stored projectiles. They hosted USO canteens, nursed in civilian hospitals, donated blood, drove Red Cross vehicles, and led scrap drives; and they processed hundreds of thousands of forms and reports. Whether or not they worked outside the home, they wholeheartedly participated in a kaleidoscope of activities to support the war effort.

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Aurora's Historic Newspaper Digitization Project

The Aurora Advocate is currently being digitized. The cost to finish the project is almost \$22,000. The Aurora Historical Society paid \$403.00 to digitize



the Aurora Advocate from October 2, 1968 through December 25, 1968. AHS members had previously donated \$609.80 to digitizing the *Aurora Advocate*. Issues from July 21,1949 through December 25, 1952 (116 issues) are already digitized and available online.
