

Spotlight on the Mayors of Aurora



Did you know that the Town of Fletcher/City of Aurora have had 43 Mayors since its beginnings back in 1891? With each issue of the Advocate Newsletter, we'll take a quick look at each of them.

MAYOR #32 Allen C. Bradley

- Served from 1955 1959
- He was born on September 20, 1915, in Nebraska

- He was a truck driver
- Married to Elizabeth Robinson on December 30, 1936, in Holyoke, CO
- They had a daughter and a son
- Chairman of the Metropolitan Cooperative Commission
- He lived at 2211 Nome and 483 Nile
- He died in March 1983
- Colorado Governors at the time he was Mayor were Edwin C. Johnson & Stephen McNichols
- While he was in office:
 - Annexation of Hoffman Heights completed (1955)
 - o Cigarette tax in Aurora increased from 1 cent to 2 cents (1957)
 - Colfax islands landscaped (1957)
 - Hoffman Heights fire station acquired by Aurora (1957)
 - Elks Lodge #1921 construction started at 14th and Oswego (1959)
 - o City water plant opened (1959)

WORLD'S MOST DARING MAN

Some of the Remarkable feats of Ivy Baldwin, who has had every bone in his body broken.

Such is the headline from the *The Washington Post* Sunday edition of 18 July 1909. Ivy Baldwin, the celebrated aeronaut and gymnast, was the topic of our March 2022 presentation at the Aurora History Museum. Ivy performed to audiences in Europe,



Japan, and Mexico in the 1800's and early 1900's. His exhibitions of bravery included diving from a tower 150 feet into a net below, performing on a trapeze suspended underneath a hot air balloon, and tightrope walking at great heights, without a net. He lived most

of his life in Denver and performed routinely at Elich Gardens. Over a period of 21 years, Ivy walked across a cable spanning the South Boulder Canyon 86 times.

Ivy put his talents to good use in 1894. He joined the United States Army Signal Corps and was promoted to the rank of sergeant. He assisted with balloon experiments at Fort Logan. When the Spanish-American war broke out, Baldwin volunteered to pilot a balloon over enemy troops to ascertain Spanish positions on the battlefield. For his efforts he received favorable commendations from the war department.

Col. Jack Stokes Ballard (USAF, Ret.) tells the story of Ivy, a diminutive daredevil from Texas. Ballard, an entertaining speaker, is also a retired high school teacher, Assistant professor of history at the Air Force Academy (1964-1969), and has been listed as a notable military historian, writer, and engineering educator by Marquis Who's Who.

Col. Ballard's passion for Ivy's adventures is evident as he retells the exploits of the performer. The material is thoroughly researched owing to Ballard's training in history. In fact, several stories were left out of the presentation for lack of supporting evidence.

Our audience enjoyed the evening. We had a few computer issues to begin with but Kenneth Ballard, who accompanied his dad, was of great assistance. Our Aurora History Museum staff was marvelous and won the day. A good time was had by all, thanks to the lively and breathtaking life of Mr. Baldwin himself who is still keeping audiences on the edge of

their seats. We raffled off two of Col. Ballard's books and a Charles Wysocki jigsaw puzzle – with a balloonist theme.

Although many think they know Annie's story through the stage, television or motion pictures, this Living History program aims to shoot down any misconceptions giving a clear and personable glimpse of the real woman behind the legend, revealing that *truth* is even more profound than fiction.

Elsa Wolff: Storyteller, singer and speaker for 18 years, Elsa has recently added *Annie Oakley* to herLiving History repertoire. Elsa captivates the audience with her touching performance as Annie.She is also known for her portrayals of Amelia Earhart, Minnie Pearl and Maria von Trapp.

Aurora History Museum Exhibits

Without a Home in Aurora

Open December 14, 2021 - May 29, 2022

Housing insecurity is a key issue facing Aurora, and to build a wider understanding of people who are often overlooked, misunderstood or unheard, staff at the Aurora History Museum engaged in an oral history project on the streets of the city. The stories collected are being presented in the museum's newest exhibit, "Without a Home in Aurora."

The personal challenges, trials, and resilience of these Aurorans are a part of the everchanging fabric of Aurora's narrative. The people profiled in this exhibition shared intimate details of their lives with the Aurora History Museum. They described how housing insecurity affects them personally and reflected on the broader issue of homelessness.

The goal of the exhibit is to shed light on a very complex and complicated social demographic.

"I really hope this exhibit brings a humane insight into the lives of some of our most vulnerable Aurorans. I hope through their interviews, our guests can see people for people and bring more awareness to a very complicated issue in our city," Museum Director T. Scott Williams said. "Further, my desire is to connect people with the resources available, as there are a lot of city programs and organizations trying to assist our housing insecure."

The conversations and connections made in the testimonials are central to the exhibit. Patrons will be able to meet over 20 Aurorans experiencing housing insecurity. Accompanying these testimonials are portraits and photography reflecting the nature of life on Aurora's streets. Much of the photography is being provided by local street photographer Amy Forestieri.

Growing Home & Trolley Trailer No. 610

Growing Home is a permanent exhibit about Aurora's history featuring Trolley Trailer No. 610, a fully-restored 1913 historic trolley trailer. The exhibit highlights people, places, and events from Aurora's history. It features over 100 historic photographs and objects, and the fully restored 1913 historic Trolley Trailer No. 610 in the new Ruth Fountain gallery. Go inside the trolley and experience 100 years of history first-hand. The exhibit was designed by Dennis Meyer of Filament Design/Build with support from museum staff.

In October 2012, the Aurora City Council approved funding for the construction of a new gallery and addition at the Aurora History Museum. Council resolved to name it in honor of Ruth Fountain, a former city councilwoman, community activist and museum supporter.

The Aurora Museum Foundation was instrumental in raising funds and in-kind donations through grants and support from local businesses, organizations and individuals. The 1,630 square foot gallery was completed in November 2014. The addition was designed by Humphries Poli Architects and built by Palace Construction.

Aurora's Historic Growth Exhibit

Aurora has grown by leaps and bounds over the decades. Once a small suburb of Denver, Aurora has boomed into the third-largest city in the state of Colorado. The city sits in three different counties: Adams County, Arapahoe County and Douglas County and lies just east of the city and county of Denver. The number of Aurorans just keeps on growing. As of July 1, 2019 the population was estimated at 381,000. The citizens of Aurora are diverse and come from many different backgrounds. The people of Aurora represent about 140 different countries. In fact around 1 in 5 Aurorans are foreign born. As the city expands geographically and demographically, it is hard not to recognize the historic growth underway. This exhibition will explore how the city has changed from its foundation up to the present day, dig deeper into the booms and busts that have defined Aurora's past and discover how growth is redefining the once small town. 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
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
